

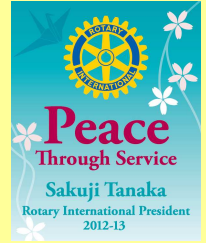

'For the purpose of doing good in the world'

For a man best known as the father of The Rotary Foundation, Arch C. Klumph was modest about his role in its creation.

In 1928, he listed three accomplishments that gave him "more satisfaction than any other contributions to Rotary" -- and launching the Foundation wasn't among them.

Instead, he emphasized his role in writing Rotary's constitution in 1915, which he asserted "gave Rotary International its first centralized power and made all the Objects and fundamentals of Rotary universal." He also took pride in establishing attendance reports and in being the first to insist upon founding a European branch office of Rotary International.

Klumph was born in the small town of Conneautville, Pennsylvania, USA, on 6 June 1869. When he was a child, his family moved to Cleveland, Ohio, where he would later become a member of the Rotary Club of Cleveland. In 1914, he was elected a director of the International Association of Rotary Clubs and served on the Constitution and By-laws Committee and the Executive Committee. He was elected Rotary's sixth president in 1916, five years after he became a Rotarian.

Near the end of his term as president, at the 1917 international convention in Atlanta, Georgia, Klumph reminded Rotarians that "Rotary is at the present time entering a new era, demanding improved methods in administrative machinery, with which to carry out the splendid principles which have been laid down heretofore." He defined six points of action, including an endowment, which would later become The Rotary Foundation:

"Carrying on, as we are, a miscellaneous community service, it seems eminently proper that we should accept endowments for the purpose of doing good in the world, in charitable, educational or other avenues of community progress, or such funds could be well used for extension work."

Through Klumph's simple yet profound statement, the Rotary Endowment Fund was born. The first contribution was made by the Rotary Club of Kansas City in 1917. By 1928, when the RI Bylaws were amended to change the name to The Rotary Foundation, the endowment fund had grown to over \$5,000. In 1929, the Foundation made its first grant: \$500 to the [International Society for Crippled Children](#), as requested by the donor, Rotary founder Paul P. Harris.

Strong May result drives final thrust

The May result was more than 20% up on May last year and this has put our region into a good position to finish of the year on a positive note. We have now closed the books on June so the year has been completed and it will be interesting to see if the momentum gained in May carried through into June. It seems to be happening so we may be in for another record year. A few comments on each country follow:

Australia – A great effort over May of last year and the 30% increase has taken their YTD into a positive position. Outstanding results from districts 9550, 9710 and 9780 plus strong performances in other districts finally has the country ahead of last year to date for the first time. Sadly, we have 10 districts below last YTD and that's had a big impact on the overall country performance.

The Philippines – Not much you can say about this performance other than – WOW! While the May result was not quite up to May last year, the YTD result is a staggering 51% up over last YTD May and most districts have performed magnificently. In dollar terms, district 3800 is leading the way and they are pushing for \$500,000 by the end of June. Great growth in contribution levels from districts 3780, 3790, 3810, 3820, 3860 and 3870 have made it an exceptional year.

New Zealand – May was again a strong month and the gains made earlier in the year are being maintained. The country and its Pacific nations is just under 30% up on last year and this is a great result. Really strong performances from districts 9920, 9940 and 9970 have underpinned the overall result and just one district is down against last year.

Indonesia – Another great success story! DG Ridlo has managed his team wonderfully well and should be congratulated on a great effort. The country is just under 50% up on YTD May last year and that's a remarkable achievement when you consider late year's result was 100% up on the year before. A fantastic effort from a fantastic team!

We should end the year well up on last year and this will put us all in good shape for the year ahead. Districts missing out this year should be analyzing just where things went wrong and where improvements can be made. A contribution to the Annual Program Fund is the life-blood of a district's DDF and the more that goes in, the more the district gets back. A strong Rotary Foundation is the responsibility of all districts and is our means of making our world a better place. As Rotarians, we shouldn't ever think of it in any other way.

Polio in Pakistan

Rotary International is aware of the recent news reports on the polio vaccination program in Pakistan. We continue to work closely with our partners in the Global Polio Eradication Initiative and the government of Pakistan to ensure our progress continues.

The good news is that Pakistan has recorded only half as many new polio cases so far this year as it had at the same time last year—this is the best proof that overall immunization coverage is improving as we adapt to the many challenges we continue to face in Pakistan.

In March, I met with Pakistan President Asif Ali Zardari, who reaffirmed his commitment to polio eradication. I thanked him for his continued support and key appointment of Shahnaz Wazir Ali as the overall point person for polio eradication at the federal level.

Pakistani Rotarians also continue work diligently toward polio eradication. They are actively working alongside health workers, monitoring immunization activities in their communities. District teams and club president-elects received training earlier this year.

Public awareness events have included polio walks, field hockey tournaments and a “Kick Polio out of Pakistan” football tournament. Pakistan Rotarians have partnered with CocaCola Pakistan, which donated billboards and signs. And earlier this month, Rotarians helped to secure the signatures of 150 Pakistani Parliamentarians in support of polio eradication.

In particular, Aziz Memon, Rotary’s National PolioPlus chair for Pakistan, has been instrumental in shoring up support for the program, working through channels at all levels. He even managed to secure the commitment of Pakistan National Cricket Captain Afridi, an extremely well-known public figure, to participate in our global public awareness campaign, “This Close.”

Pakistani and Indian Rotarians also are working together to share best practices and lessons learned from India’s recent success at stopping the spread of indigenous polio, an incredible milestone that removed India from the list of polio-endemic countries.

Pakistan too has made great progress toward polio eradication this year, and we will continue to work in every polio-affected country toward our goal of a world where this terrible disease is no longer a threat to children anywhere.

Preparing for Future Vision, San Diego, California, USA

District governors-elect, district Rotary Foundation committee chairs, and RRFs will be trained on the new grants during the International Assembly in 2013. The Future Vision training with governors-elect, district Foundation committee chairs, and regional Rotary Foundation coordinators will take place on Friday, 18 January the last day of the International Assembly. An additional day of training for district Rotary Foundation committee chairs and regional Rotary Foundation coordinators will take place on Saturday, 19 January. Registration and travel details will be available in the coming months. Note that travel arrangements will need to be made through RITS and participants are **not** authorized to book travel at this time.

New PHF Recognition folder will reduce costs

The Rotary Foundation Trustees continue to find innovative ways to reduce expenses with their decision to change the Paul Harris Fellow recognition award from the current padded cover to a quality cardboard folder. It is estimated that this move will save \$125,000 a year annually, making more financial resources available for The Foundation's humanitarian and educational programs.

All Paul Harris Fellow certificates will be issued in the new folder beginning 1 August.

[Paul Harris Fellow](#) recognition, established in 1957 in honor of Rotary's founder, expresses appreciation for a \$1,000 contribution to The Rotary Foundation. Rotarians may also designate a Paul Harris Fellow to recognize another person who supports the Foundation's mission of building world understanding and peace. More than 1.3 million individuals have been named Paul Harris Fellows

Foundation Cups set for change?

It's been a very exciting and tense struggle as we've neared year-end and the possibility of the perennial favourites being dethroned is very real indeed.

Last year's Per Capita Cup winners in Australia was district 9810 by a strong challenge from district 9550 in the north is very real indeed. It should be an interesting June result! It's also been a fantastic result again from districts 9800, 9680, 9750 and 9455 that continually show their support to the Rotary Foundation in the best possible manner.

The New Zealand Cup went to district 9910 for the past two years and they are currently locked in a neck-to-neck race with district 9920. These are the only two candidates for the top spot and it could go either way.

District 3800 in The Philippines won the top spot last year and it looks like they've held on for another great win. District 3400 (Indonesia) has performed remarkably well to throw out a serious challenge but they may just fall a little short. There have been some great improvements recorded amongst this group and none better than district 3860. Jun Borromeo has lifted his district up from \$38.42 last year to \$106.35 at the end on May and that's a truly magnificent effort. Well done Jun!

All regions are showing growth at the end of June and that's always a good sign. The Per Capita result is always a good indication of a club or district's commitment to making our Foundation a dominant force in supporting Rotary International's quest for world peace. The more work we do to make life better for people the less chance we have of going to war. It's as simple as that but this philosophy needs the support of every Rotarian, every year.

Class IX at UQ visits Australia's capital Canberra

Canberra Rotarians hosted Class IX University of Queensland Rotary Peace Fellows during their annual three-day visit to Australia's capital in April. The visit provided fellows a chance to discuss international aid with experts from AusAID, learn about the links between the military and non-government organizations at the Australian Civil-Military Centre, discuss current policies, including the question of refugees, with a Member of the Federal Parliament amongst other opportunities. The fellows also had a chance to present their personal stories and ideas for the future to Rotarians and guests at a Foundation dinner -- a thoughtful and stimulating talk by General Peter Leahy who discussed the role of peacekeeping in the strategy of the Australian defense agenda.—*Bruce Alan*

Imagination Library coming to Australia? - Books from Dollywood

When the singer, Dolly Parton, established Imagination Library, she only had to look back to her childhood years and instantly, two vivid memories would quickly come back. First she remembered disliking the feel of hand-me-down books; and next, the joy of having the book delivered to her house, even if it was just a Sears catalogue.

So at Imagination Library, a program that involves sending a high-quality, age-relevant book a month to a child with the aim of fostering a love for reading, two things are musts: that all books are new and that they are delivered to the home of each child recipient.

Imagination Library, established by Parton in 1996 initially for the benefit of her home county in East Tennessee, USA, serves children in the United States, Canada, and the United Kingdom. In 2001, 2,500 children were participating in the program; today they number almost 700,000.

In 2009 Imagination Library and Rotary International teamed up and since then, Rotary Clubs involved in the program serve roughly 300 communities. "I don't think we could do it without Rotary's involvement," David Dotson, president of the Dollywood Foundation, said. "If you look at Rotary's presence in the world, it may be that the greatest aspect of our relationship is yet to come."

"The number of books you have at home is a good indicator of future success in school," said Claire Derome, 2009-10 president of the Rotary Club of Whitehorse-Rendezvous of Yukon in Canada. With the Yukon government and the Yukon Literacy Coalition, the club brought Imagination Library there; currently, there are 900 children enrolled in the program. The Dollywood Foundation and the participating community split the program costs; in Yukon, the club covers the US\$3.60 per child per month.

Our office together with United Way are looking at the feasibility of launching in Australia. The decision rests with the Dollywood Foundation. More information will be sent to the District Governors with clubs in Australia.

All claims for DG expenses including DG allocation, Additional Training Subsidy, Governor Elect Training (as DGE) and Assistant Governor Training must be submitted to our office prior to 31 July 2012.

You can use the forms that have previously been provided to you, or the ones that are able to be downloaded in your DG Exchange on Member Access. Please make sure that when you have a lot of claims to list on one report (such as on the Automobile Log) that you do not simply keep on adding lines, but add extra pages.

Reports must be clearly presented. Handwritten is accepted, but it must be able to read clearly. Receipts must be provided for all expenses US\$75 or over.

CDS here in Parramatta is where you lodge applications for any new clubs in the family of Rotary:

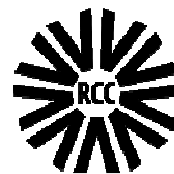

for being the first clubs to pay their July 2012 SAR. Their payments were in the post or in the banking system as early as June 29.

By now, clubs should have already received their electronic SARs via email. The paper form of the SAR invoice is also enroute to the clubs as well. If club officers prefer to opt out of the paper version, they may do so by following the link on the previous emails.

Your feedback regarding this new initiative will be greatly appreciated.

We would also like to thank the IPDGs for their support and patience with the various process improvements that had been implemented during their tenure.

To review, Recognition Process Management (RPM) was implemented on September 2011 followed by Global Payments System (GPS) in October. RPM sped up the reporting process for contributions through to recognition and shipment, automating the latter once certain levels of recognition are reached. GPS allowed for online contributions in AUD and NZD. While there are still some unresolved issues on this, we are optimistic that these will be resolved within the next quarter.

The change in RI's banking arrangements in the Philippines had also been a challenge. But with the help of the IPDGs, RRFCs, AGs, and the Philippine Rotarian Magazine through the kindness of Rtn Merlito Salazar, this information was well circulated to allow for a seamless transition.

To the FY 12-13 DGs, we look forward to forging strong partnerships with you in the year ahead. Please remind your clubs to settle their accounts within 90 days. By October, clubs that have not done so will receive collection emails as well as reminder letters by post. Please assist us in credit management issues such as this.

At the time of this section's writing, there are still 7 Australian/NZ clubs and 14 Philippine Clubs that have yet to settle their January 2012 dues. It is our hope that 100% of the clubs will be off the termination list in the coming SAR periods and we strongly rely on your support to achieve this goal.

I would like to personally extend our services to all the FY12-13 club and district officers. We are here to assist you in any matter concerning dues and contributions. Most importantly, we would like to wish all of you the best in the year ahead!
