WED 11TH MAY: SUMMER SCIENCE KIDS



Every year Rotary hold the "Summer Science Forum" for top NZ Science students about to enter year 13 at school.

Of the 1,000 plus applicants 140 students are chosen and they get to spend two weeks of their school holidays at Auckland University on a residential course exploring science subjects on offer - and playing volley ball.

This last year 3 students from Rutherford College were awarded places - and they came to us, as their sponsoring Club, to tell us all about it.

Michaela Spencer, Pang Yuk Cheung and Pang Ying Cheung totally enjoyed the experience of the forum and all were adamant that it was a life changing experience not to be forgotten, that it has been an eye-opener into the world of science, and has done a lot to clarify their thinking for next year.

GRANDMA

We were contacted by the Waitemata District Health Board for help. One of their clients is a 75 year old grandmother whose daughter, a very active member of the community, died suddenly in her sleep over a year ago. Grandma, who isn't in great health, was left to raise her two grandsons who are now aged 15 and 19 on her own. The younger boy is at doing very well at school, the elder one is at University and working part time to help support the family.

Financial help from Government sources, other than Grandma's pension, is unavailable as they fall into cracks in the system and they have some big problems including no spare cash to do urgent house repairs.



Their house is in desperate need of maintenance and we have been asked to help with this and teach the boys some handyman skills. Craiger, Alan and Kerry have been to visit the family and firmly believe that this is a very nice family who really deserve help.

Kerry left the meeting with stray tools, like the lawnmower, to repair and has since been back to return them and trim some of the overgrown vegetation that was leaning on the house. The youngest son gave him a hand with this after school.

They also had a slightly damaged car that was off the road due to a minor accident. Kerry and Lynn have spent a couple of days getting it back on the road for them.

Alan took his water blaster around on Monday and has cleaned up the outside of the house, drive and paths.

Craiger is planning on putting the gate back on its hinges and various other repair jobs.

Once the Challenge Camp is over we will have a working bee to finish clearing the outside and paint the exterior of the house. Any Club member who can help with this is very, very welcome.

The date for the working bee will be set after the Challenge Camp when we have an idea of what the weather is doing.

Paul Harris Fellowships – Place orders now – Note from Parramatta - We are approaching that time of the year when things start to get a little frantic in this office as we strive to deliver excellence in service to those clubs and Rotarians wanting

to recognise their colleagues with the presentation of Paul Harris Fellow Recognition. Club and District Changeover time is the time we all like to recognize people in this special way but it does put additional pressures on our system. One way of overcoming this problem is to ask clubs to submit their applications early - and the earlier the better. Anything received after June 6th will be doubtful in terms of delivery before the end of June although we will always do our best to accommodate the numerous "last minute" and "urgent" request we receive. It would be truly helpful if Foundation Chairs could get a note out to all clubs highlighting this issue. While I realise the normal way of transmitting this information is through a Governors Newsletter or a Foundation Newsletter, I fear it may be too late if left until the June issues. A note direct to clubs on this specific matter immediately would be highly appreciated and more beneficial to clubs.

CHRISTCHURCH PLEA - GREAT PROGRESS BUT MUCH MORE TO DO AND YOU CAN HELP. It is now two months since the devastating 22 February earthquake in Christchurch and while there has been huge progress, along with the ever present aftershocks, residents' stress levels, health and hygiene, accommodation and financial concerns remain and will be present for months if not years ahead. And Rotary will be there every step of the way, working collaboratively in many cases as has happened with so many Christchurch clubs supporting the vital activities of the Salvation Army (and others) as they deliver welcome food parcels and other essentials to needy families, help to clear the properties of those unable to do this themselves due to age or infirmity and so much more. The Rotarians of Christchurch are doing this despite facing their own challenges. The generous donations from Rotarians and supporters from around the world have passed the \$1 million mark - a massive response! This will be needed in the time ahead as Rotary starts to implement projects carefully targeted to those in most need under the guidance of a special project committee set up to receive and process applications for support projects and assistance.
