THIS WEEK

CRAIGER AND KERRY ON VANUATU

Some months ago District approached our Club about undertaking a project in a high school in Orap on Malekula Island in Vanutau. Kerry and Craiger went over with a supply of materials to do some work and scope out the work required.

Our last project was on Tongoa Island in a fairly subsistence level village. To get to the village one used a frequently closed airport <everyone has no doubt heard of our travels by sea>, a partially useful road and a hike over the mountain to get to the village.

Malekula is completely different. The airport has a sealed surface so remains open even in torrential tropical downpours and the 30km road to the village is fully open to 4 wheel drive vehicles. No hiking over mountains required.

Rather than a largely vegetarian diet from local gardens – with the odd small pig roasted over a spit – food is bought from a shop and the butcher in town.

Power is coming to the village but in the meantime they use generators till 9pm every night – rather than on and off when they have a spare can of petrol.

In the outlying islands of Vanuatu all children go to school up to the age of 12. For many children High School requires boarding away from home and is unaffordable. The boys asked around and discovered that the average annual income for a worker is 20,000 vatu (\$NZ 6,000) – and High School fees are

also 20,000 per year (this sort of puts our school fees into perspective!)

For those who think our schools are tough: The kids wake at 5:45am, have breakfast and are in school by 7am. Classes continue till 11am when there is a break till 3pm. Classes then recommence till dinner at 6pm. After dinner homework is done till bed at 9pm when the generator turns off.

Some of the students are day students from local villages and travel up to 10km each way every day – on foot.

The school at Orap has been through ups and downs in recent years. In 2007 the role was 270 kids and by last year it dropped to 50. A new principal has been employed and the role has now risen to 90 students this year.

Some of the buildings in the school are good whilst others have suffered the ravages of time and are in need of maintenance or replacement.


The two projects we have been asked to help with are:

- Completing a new dining/recreation building
- Replacing the boys' dormitory with a new building.

The school received a grant to start the dining/recreation building and was given excellent plans to build it from. Unfortunately... the plans were in English and the locals speak French, and the money was insufficient to build it to spec so shortcuts were taken by local builders. Craiger is seeking help from Engineers to determine whether the building is safe to continue with.

(This could take time – most Engineers at the moment are flat out with Christchurch work)

The dormitory is a major project and further thought is required.




The concrete driveway (photo on left) looked good so off the boys went to check it out. They returned laughing to say "Excellent track. For a Survivor series!"
