HURTLING downhill at speeds of 60kmh has earned one lucky youngster a ticket to the United States.

The soapbox derby team from Remuera Intermediate School won the national competition on Sunday at Stanmore Bay.

And it was Remuera 11-year-old Andrew Jantke who drove the side to victory.


The win means Andrew gets to go to the All-American Soap Box Derby World Championship in Ohio, US, from July 20 to 26.

Hearing his name called as the winner was a special moment, Andrew says.

"Everyone went crazy, yelling and cheering.

"I came second last year so it just felt really good to beat

The primary school came second at nationals this year.

"He has really ignited something in these kids. He has put his heart and soul into this and it has meant they all have a passion for it," Victoria Jantke says.

The eastern competition was held in West Auckland this year because a key sponsor pulled out and not enough east schools entered (East & Bays Courier, March 14).


Hopefully the derby will be back in Stonefields in 2015, Mukhtar says.
